

Centerville Edges Out Springboro in Defensive Showdown, Advances in Playoffs

In an intense defensive battle at Centerville Stadium on Friday night, the Centerville Elks secured a 14-7 victory over the Springboro Panthers to advance in the OHSAA state playoffs. The game marked the team's second meeting this season, with Centerville taking the first matchup 28-10. This time, however, Springboro made the Elks work even harder for the win.

Springboro's offense was limited to just 35 rushing yards, a testament to Centerville's stifling defense led by seniors Jacob Taylor, and Quinten Robinson, who notched nine tackles each. Senior defensive back Andrew Erwin also made a crucial impact, intercepting a pass after teammate Bryce Broham-Thomas tipped a pass from Springboro quarterback Max Miller.

Springboro's first and only score came in the second quarter, when running back Mattias Brunicardi found a gap and completed a four-yard touchdown run. That gave the Panthers a 7-0 lead and put pressure on Centerville to respond.

The Elks answered in the fourth quarter with a gutsy 21-yard quarterback keeper from junior Shane Cole, who eluded Springboro defenders to reach the end zone. This touchdown, set up by Erwin's timely interception, swung momentum in Centerville's favor. Cole, who completed 11 of his 15 passes for 111 yards, was steady through the night, keeping Springboro's defense on their toes with both his arm and legs.

Junior running back Parker Johnson led the Elks' ground attack with 87 rushing yards on 15 carries, including a 41-yard burst that ended up being the game-winning score. Johnson's strength and balance at 5'10" and 210 pounds wore down the Springboro defense, helping Centerville secure the victory.

The win didn't come without a few tense moments, though, as kicker Leland Gantz uncharacteristically missed two field goal attempts. But with Centerville's defense holding strong, those missed opportunities didn't come back to haunt them. Now advancing deeper into the playoffs, Centerville will look to build on this gritty performance, As they advance to the next round, the Elks are a team to watch, blending defensive strength, and offensive agility in their quest for continuous improvement.

The Elks have played their last three games at home. Dublin Coffman has played their last two games on the road. Do you think the Rocks have an advantage with their road experience?

At this point in the season, every team has traveled and been on the road multiple times. I don't think it's an advantage at this point when teams play at a neutral site. We absolutely love playing at home, with our own facilities, and with our home crowd and student body, but we look forward to the opportunity to get on the road. We don't control where the game is at. We don't control how often the opposition has been on the road. We control our Attitude and our Effort. That's all we can control and we are excited to do just that in Springfield on Friday night.

Which Dublin Coffman players do you expect to be key in this crucial game?

They definitely have some really great players on their team. The quarterback, Amari Valero-Hudson, #1, is a really great athlete. He's fun to watch. He's fast, shifty, and competes very hard when he's got the ball in his hand. Another player I've been very impressed with is Christian Werling, #95. They move him all over the place and he's a pivotal part of their offense and defense. He seems like an old-school type of football player that would probably fit in very well at Centerville. Those two are very good players, but they also have a very good team. They have created a lot of depth for themselves by playing a lot of guys in a lot of positions, on both sides of the ball. They've done a good job and they are a very good team.

How do you prepare your team mentally for the pressure of a high-stakes playoff game, and what message do you convey to them to ensure they stay focused and composed?

Respectfully, there's no pressure. There's pressure when you are results-based, meaning that you think "What do I have to do to win this game?" This team is not, has not been, and will not be, results-based. Our players, coaches, and program is process-based. Don't get us wrong, we want to win. We are going to compete to win. But that's not the end-all-be-all. All year these players and coaches have been trying to be better today than they were yesterday. That's the mentality we have had and that's the mentality we will have Friday night. When you move from being results-based to process-based, an added perk is that it removes the pressure, because Friday night is simply part of the process of us being better today than we were yesterday. Regardless of the outcome, we will be better for having competed our hardest on Friday night, with great Attitude and great Effort, as a Team. All year it's been Us vs Us, and Friday night will be no different. We respect our opponent, we respect the game of football, and we respect this game, but there is no pressure.


Inside the Headset

Having witnessed a player from the other team throwing a cheap shot last week, how do you plan to ensure your team maintains discipline and avoids retaliation on the field?

We talk about this all the time. You have to have a team-first mentality. What is best for the team is more important than what is best for the individual. Sometimes players get heated. That's part of the game. It happens. But when you don't control your reaction, and let your emotions dictate your actions, you're being selfish and putting yourself before the team. No one is perfect, but we strive for a team-first mentality 100% of the time and we have to remember to put our teammates before our egos. A cheap shot or a costly penalty can not only cause a player to be removed from the game (and two more games), but can also cost the team the game. In the playoffs, the teams are very good, and can make you pay for a costly turnover or penalty. This is a very tough skill to master, being team-first, but it is paramount in our sport if we are going to be successful.

There are only 16 division 1 teams left in the playoffs. How does your team feel about this accomplishment and the opportunity they face Friday night?

We have also been talking about this a lot, being Grateful. We are very fortunate to be in the situation we are in. We are very fortunate to have the support that we have. We are very fortunate to be able to spend one more day together as a team. We always ask, "How do you show your gratitude?" Well, we've settled in that our answer to that question is EFFORT. When you want to show your teacher that you're grateful for them, you give them effort. When you want to show your wife and kids that you're grateful for them, you give them effort. When you want to show your team and program that you're grateful for them, you pour more and more effort. Effort looks different from situation to situation, but Gratitude is not only a feeling, but also an action. Our team is incredibly grateful to spend this week together. We have been pouring EFFORT into each other, into our preparation, and into our program. We will continue to pour more EFFORT on Friday and if we are fortunate enough to receive another day together, we will continue the process.

Johnson's late TD run lifts Centerville past Springboro

CENTERVILLE – Parker Johnson took the direct snap, tucked the ball in his right hand and burst to the right – only to find several Springboro defenders.

"I thought I was going to get

"I thought I was going to get tackled and my legs kept driving and I just broke away," Johnson said.

The Centerville High School junior running back cut back to the left, found an opening and sprinted to the end zone to lift the Elks to a 14-7 victory over the Panthers in a Division I, Region 2 quarterfinal game on Friday night at Centerville Stadium.

Johnson and junior quarterback Shane Cole combined for 151 rushing yards for the Elks (9-3), which advanced to Week 13 for the second time in three seasons.

"Our players made plays when they needed to make plays," said Centerville coach Brent Ullery. "Our defense kept us in the game the entire time. Hats off to Springboro, they're a great team, well-coached with great players. That's an OHSAA playoff game for you."

Sophomore quarterback Max Miller threw for 127 yards and junior running back Mattias Brunicardi rushed for 64 yards and a TD as Springboro finished its season 7-5. The Panthers turned the ball over three times in the game, including twice in the third quarter in Centerville territory.

"I thought they came out and played hard," said Panthers coach Ryan Wilhite. "We just turned it over too many times. In a close game like that, it's going to come down to protecting the football. We had a couple opportunities to really pull ahead and every time we turned it over."

The Elks drove the ball into Panthers territory early in the first quarter, but weren't able to convert a field goal attempt from 47 yards by senior Leland Cantz

Springboro took the lead on a 4-yard run by Brunicardi with 8:44 remaining in the first half. Another Elks drive stalled late in the first half and another field goal attempt by Gantz from 52 yards fell just short of the goalpost as time expired.

Early in the fourth quarter, Centerville senior Andrew Erwin intercepted a pass and returned it into Springboro territory. A few plays later, Cole scored on a 26-yard run to tie the game with 9:20 remaining.

"We just kept pushing," Johnson said. "They got tired and we were able to break away a little bit more (in the second half)."

The Panthers drove the ball to the Elks 31-yard line, but they were unable to convert on fourth down. After a long run by Cole pushed the ball to midfield, Johnson broke loose for his game-winning TD scamper.

"He's so impressive," Ullery said. "He gets better every week, he wants the ball and you see why he wants the ball."

Johnson "made a great play" to give the Elks the lead, Wilhite said.

"We had a guy beat in the backfield and don't get him on the ground and he goes for a touchdown," he said. "Credit to them."

The Panthers again drove the ball down the field in the final minute, but Centerville junior Brady Seeley sacked Miller on third down and they weren't able to convert on 4th-and-20.

A year after going 2-9, Springboro improved to 7-5 and advanced to a second-round playoff game for the second time in three seasons.

"I'm really proud of this team," Wilhite said. "The spirit of this team and the way they've bonded together, they've been a pleasure to coach. I really love this group."

The Elks improved to 9-3, winning their seventh straight game. They advanced to face Dublin Coffman (4-8) — which beat Lebanon 56-20 to advance to the third round — in a Region 2 semifinal game at 7 p.m. Nov. 15 at a site to be determined.

"It's awesome," Ullery said.
"We're grateful for every opportunity. This is Day 201 of our season. We're just excited that we get 202."

Wayne claims rematch from Fairmont to advance

KETTERING – Tyrell Lewis ran for a touchdown and threw for another to lead Wayne to a 20-10 regional quarterfinal win over Fairmont at Roush Stadium.

Fairmont, the Greater Western Ohio Conference co-champion and top seed in Division I, Region 2, struck first with a methodical 72-yard drive on its first possession.

The Firebirds (9-3) ran it 11 times with Logan Doty finishing the drive with a 3-yard run over right tackle with 2:06 left in the first quarter.

Doty had 45 yards on the drive as eight men in the box proved not to be enough for the Wayne defense to stop Fairmont's triple-option attack.

No. 8 seed Wayne (7-5)

dodging tacklers to find his way across the goal line with 6:34 to go.

to go.

"The coaches have been talking to him about just not being denied, giving it your all in those situations," Wayne coach Roosevelt Mukes said. "Zay has done a great job all year."

That put the Firebirds, who did not throw a pass while defeating the Warriors 43-22 in Week 5, behind the eight-ball.

They drove across midfield, but the drive was snuffed out when Wayne's Amare Gordon made a leaping interception at the Wayne 7-yard line with under five minutes on the clock.

The Warriors were not able to run out the clock before punting the ball back to Fairmont, but Gordon tipped a ball into the arms of Marvin Williams for another interception to put the game away.

That brought an end to one of the most successful seasons in Fairmont history.

"It's one of those things that the dust is going to need to settle," Miller said. "We did a lot of good things. I mean, I'm very proud of our kids, start to finish. Definitely a tough loss, but I think we look back on it, and there's a lot to be proud of this year. They kind of set the tone for hopefully the guys who come after 'em."

Fairmont, playing again with-

responded with an 80-yard march that featured a pair of fourth down conversions, including one at the Warriors 27 early in the drive. They converted that with a 4-yard swing pass from Lewis to Isaiah Thompson, then Lewis finished the drive with a 34-yard run on a fourth-and-2. He faked a jet sweep to the right, kept the ball and found a wide open lane to his left.

"I've seen the lane as soon as I snapped the ball and cut up, and I knew I had it," Lewis said. "I knew nobody was catching me."

That tied the game at 7 with 9:32 left in the second quarter, and Wayne took the lead early in the third after stopping Fairmont on downs at the Firebirds 19-yard line, an early gamble that did not pay off for Fairmont coach Dave Miller.

The Warriors stuffed Doty on

back-to-back runs up the middle in the triple I then needed four plays to put the ball in the end zone and take their first lead of the night.

Lewis found Teaunn Hunter in the end zone on a fourth-and-4 from the Fairmont 14. That put the Warriors on top 13-7, but the lead stayed there when Jamier Averette-Brown's pass went over the head of his intended receiver in the end zone on the PAT.

"I actually called that play," Lewis said of the touchdown. "We ran a play last year, and I knew they would be ready for it. It's kind of like a flat-and-up, a double move to make them bite on it. We put everyone over to the other said and he came across and I threw it to him. It was drawn up perfectly. It was the perfect play."

He finished with 133 yards

passing and 88 yards rushing.

The Firebirds went on another long drive on the ensuing possession, but a personal foul on a chop block put them behind the chains after they got into the red zone. That ultimately led to the hosts settling for a 33-yard field goal by senior Max Gehring with 8:17 left.

They nearly got the ball back two plays later in Warriors territory, but a potential interception went through a defender's hands. Wayne still faced thirdand-14 on the next play, but Lewis came up with a big conversion when he found Gauge Miesse open in the seam for 29 yards.

One play later, Thompson delivered a bigger dagger with a 55-yard touchdown scamper, tight-roping the sideline and

out senior quarterback Brock Baker because of a knee injury, had 273 total yards, including 135 from Doty, a sophomore.

Baker's understudy, junior JJ Hill, completed 3 of 8 passes for 31 yards and ran for 37 yards.

Both coaches agreed they felt the need to go for it frequently on fourth down because of the stakes of the game – and the fact the Firebirds like to play keep away if they can.

away if they can. "You got to go get them when you can, but we'll learn from it," Miller said. "I just feel bad for our seniors. That's a great senior class, and super proud of what they've done. And I think we've got some really good young guys that watched everything they did. And I think in the future, we'll be better for it."

Wayne moves on to play No. 5 seed Hilliard Davidson at a neutral site next Friday night. The Wildcats beat crosstown rival Hilliard Bradley 34-12. "First of all, to God be the glory," Mukes said. "Our players and our coaches have done a great job, and I think at this time of year, man, it's about trusting your guys and trusting your coaches. And there is no tomorrow, you know what? So you never want to have, coulda, woulda, shoulda."
