

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Centerville Elks Dominate Dublin Coffman, Set Up Rivalry Clash with Wayne

The Centerville Elks continued their playoff march on Friday night, defeating the Dublin Coffman Rocks 42-7 in the third round of the OHSAA state playoffs. The win not only propelled Centerville to the regional finals but also set the stage for their eagerly anticipated 71st meeting with the Wayne Warriors, their fierce rival in southwest Ohio.

The game was essentially decided in the first half, as the Elks exploded for 28 unanswered points before the break. The opening kick-off saw Centerville's sophomore defensive back and kick returner, Ziere Alston, electrify the Elk Nation crowd with a stunning 93-yard touchdown return, setting the tone early.

Centerville's offense was just as efficient, with junior quarterback Shane Cole putting on a clinic. He completed all 11 of his passes for 230 yards, including two touchdown passes—one to senior receiver Ryan Swanson and another to junior Soren Vitas. Swanson also had a standout performance, contributing 110 receiving yards and a touchdown, showcasing his ability to gain yards after the catch.

"That was a great job sticking to the process, making it about the process, rather than the results," said Centerville head coach Brent Ullery, highlighting his team's disciplined execution.

Coffman's offense struggled to find a rhythm, despite a strong individual performance by quarterback Amari Valerio-Hudson. The Army commit was under constant pressure from the Black Shirts defense, which sacked him once and disrupted his rhythm throughout the game. Valerio-Hudson did manage to break free for a 3-yard rushing touchdown, but it came with just seconds left in the game, long after the outcome had been decided.

Despite having 294 total yards of offense, the Rocks couldn't capitalize on their opportunities in the red zone, converting only 1 of 3 attempts into points. With a first and goal from the Elks five yard line, the Black Shirts had their finest hour with a goal line stand, crushing the Rocks spirit. In contrast, Centerville was efficient, converting 2 of 3 red zone chances into touchdowns.

The Elks' defense, led by senior linebacker Jackson Puckett and senior defensive back Andrew Erwin, shut down Coffman's offense for much of the game. Erwin led with 8 tackles, and Puckett added 5 tackles, with a crucial pass break up to stop Coffman on the Elks three-yard line.

With this victory, the Elks now sets its sights on Wayne, a team they defeated earlier this season, 38-14. The next battle at Welcome Stadium in this storied rivalry is sure to be another thrilling chapter in high school football.

Inside the Headset



The Dublin Coffman game was one of the best performances in all three areas of the game in recent history. Looking back, what did you see were the keys to delivering this impressive win?

I think it's directly-related to the mindset that this team and coaches have. All year, we have been facing a nameless and faceless opponent. The opponent has not mattered. Our main focus, and our primary "opponent," has always been ourselves. We have been laser-focused on improving ourselves and examining ourselves under a microscope. Additionally, this mindset has freed us from having to look into the future. We don't have to wait for another opponent each week or change what we do and how we do it. I think when you have this kind of mindset, you allow yourself the opportunity to be constantly improving and that's what this team has been doing. They show up each day. They put in the work each day. All of the credit goes to the players and their assistant coaches. They have done a great job of getting better each day and last Friday was simply a byproduct of that.

In the locker room before taking the field, you told the players, specifically the kickoff return team, to execute the return better than they ever had before, then the offense to do the same, and keep stacking these plays and the results will be great. Would you agree that the opening kickoff return was the turning point in the game?

Big plays in special teams can be major turning points in the game. In the playoffs, these plays can mean even more. That play was fun and exciting but in my opinion, returning the opening kickoff for a touchdown can actually be the least-impactful of the big plays if that makes sense. There was only 12 seconds elapsed on the play I believe. There was still a ton of time and the opponent was getting the ball. Yes, there's momentum and it's exciting, but there's still a lot of football to play. Our players still had to make great plays and play a great game after that. That play was great because it was a team-play. Everyone had to make blocks and the ball carrier had to do a great job. That play was not great because it was a kickoff return for a touchdown at the beginning. In our locker room, since I was a player here, we have had a sign that reads "5 or 6 plays are going to decide the outcome of the game." The thing is, we just don't know what those 5 or 6 plays are until the game is over. That play was one of those plays, but there were definitely others.

In two of the three playoff games the Elks have had the advantage of a running clock for the entire second half, whereas the Wayne Warriors have not had the running clock in any of their three playoff games. How big is the benefit of resting your starters for two quarters as the Elks continue this deep run in the playoffs?

There are a lot of factors that go into being successful in the playoffs. A little bit of luck goes a long way, some calls and bounces in your direction can go a long way. One thing we talk to our team about is how health and longevity can go a long way too. We have to take care of our bodies. We have to get great treatment with Brandon whenever we are free. We have to get great rest, nutrition, and hydration. We have to constantly work on improving our bodies. When you can play in a running clock, and limit the amount of impact on a Friday night, that can help and has been beneficial to us. Yes, we prefer the difficult games where we have to strain and learn more about ourselves, but playing in a running clock definitely helps to keep guys more fresh. However, I'll say this: This is Centerville vs Wayne. It's a great game. Everyone finds a way to play in it. We will see all of their players and they will see all of ours. The guys love playing in this game, and whether a player is dinged-up a little won't matter. They will all play and they will all play very hard.

Inside the Headset

The Elks and the Warriors met was in the regional semi-finals 14 years ago in front of a capacity crowd at Welcome Stadium. That game was recognized as an "Instant Classic" by the media, featured two future NFL players, and was decided on Wayne's last play of the second overtime period. Do you and your staff share moments in this incredible rivalry tradition with the current Elks?

We define Tradition as paying it forward, and leaving this place better than we found it. We define Tradition as pouring into whatever situation you're in and leaving it better than you found it. But in order to live with great Tradition, we believe it's important to understand the Tradition of Centerville Football. Our players get a constant education in our tradition. Whether it be direct lessons about a history with a team (they get this every week) or simply stories and anecdotes from the coaches, our players are learning more and more about our Tradition daily. Whether we talk about that game this week still remains to be determined and will stay within our locker room walls. The players have already learned that every time they play Wayne, it's a big game. They have already seen it once this year when we played in week 10. We don't need to hype it up or anything like that. We need to keep our focus on getting better each day.

A reporter asked Indiana Coach Cignetti how he was going to prepare the Hoosiers this week in the "biggest game" in Indiana football history, playing Ohio State in Columbus. Coach Cignetti's response has been trending across social media, "We will approach this like any other game, it is a big game, because it is the next game. We are process-driven, process-oriented, we got to stack moments, and days to put ourselves in the best position to have success, play our game, and play it well." His reply reminded me of your coaching philosophy with the Elks. It is obvious that this approach is working well for your team and the staff. Have you always coached with this approach, how did it evolve, and who was your mentor that first introduced it to you?


I'll admit, I have not. I used to stew over hours of film and look for ways to try and beat teams with scheme, plays, special drills, etc... However, about 4 or 5 years ago I decided to open up my ears more and close my mouth more. When I did that, I was able to see that our basketball coach, Brook Cupps, really knows what he's talking about. I also found his business partner, and Centerville Football alumni, Ryan Hawk. They both speak to surrendering the outcome and embracing the process. It was hard at first, but through consistency, we were able to find ways to embrace the process and think less and less about the result. Now, as we move through the season, we think less and less about the opponent and more about how we can improve on what we did yesterday. We don't evaluate whether we won or lost, but rather, did we improve on what we were working on and if we are working on the correct things. It's actually very refreshing when you embrace this process. You control a lot more than you think. You stop trying to control the other team and you start controlling yourself, your effort, and your attitude a lot more. I will say this, while Brook and Ryan have been great people for me to study, talk to, and learn from, I'll say that I've learned that a lot more successful people have this approach. It's seems like it must be a prerequisite for success to completely ignore the success and embrace the process. Coach Cignetti knows this, but even greats like Kobe Bryant, Tiger Woods, and Nick Saban all think exactly like this.

Centerville, Wayne win to set up all-GWOC regional final; Alter advances; MAC goes 5-0

Centerville and Wayne are headed for an all-Greater Western Ohio Conference regional final after winning their Division I, Region 2 playoff games on Friday night.

Centerville beat Dublin Coffman 42-7 and Wayne topped Hilliard Davidson 31-7.

Centerville got off to a quick start when Ziere Alston returned the opening kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown.

Parker Johnson scored on a 24-yard run and Shane Cole tossed TD passes to Soren Vitas and Ryan Swanson to send Centerville into the half up 28-0.

Alston and Ethan Ireland each added second-half scoring runs and Centerville moved on to its third regional final in school his-

For Wayne, Tyrell Lewis hit Jamier Averette-Brown on a pair of long touchdown passes to grab an early lead.

Lewis tacked on two more TD runs and Carson Limberg booted a short field goal.

Alex Corbin and Aden Vaughn each snagged interceptions to lead the Wayne defense.

Wayne improved to 8-5 and Centerville moved to 10-3 heading into next Friday's regional final. The Ohio High School Athletic Association will announce all regional finals sites on Sunday.

Liberty, North win playoff thrillers

Centerville takes control early against Dublin Coffman

Centerville put a quick end to Coffman's late-season surge, dominating the 14th-seeded Shamrocks (4-9) in a Division I, Region 2 semifinal that went to a running clock in the third quarter.

The second-seeded Elks (10-3) opened a 21-0 lead in the first quarter.

"We're not good enough," Coffman coach Geron Stokes said. "This was coming. We played a good team. Their defense is great. You go down 7-0 quick."

Ziere Alston returned the opening kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown.

Centerville held <u>Coffman quarterback Amari Valerio-Hudson</u> in check for most of the night after he had led the Shamrocks to three straight wins. Valerio-Hudson, who entered the game with 2,115 yards and 31 touchdowns rushing, scored on a 3-yard run in the final minute and finished with 123 yards on 21 carries.

"They have a good defense," Valerio-Hudson said. "They did what they were supposed to do. We could have executed better, but overall they played hard. ... They flew around. It was tough."

Dublin Coffman coach pleased with late-season surge

Faced with a 1-8 record and saddled with a seven-game losing streak heading into the regular-season finale, Coffman won three in a row, beating Hilliard Bradley 49-28 before playoff wins over Westland (49-42) and Lebanon (56-20).

Stokes was impressed with his team's resiliency.

"I'm just proud of the people that stood with us," Stokes said. "There's only a few. There's our locker room and our staff and a handful of parents. ... We went on a seven-game losing streak and these kids never flinched, never changed. There's a lot of people who can't do that. There's a lot of people who talk and don't have the toughness to continue to stay with us and our guys did."

Valerio-Hudson, an Army commit, was pleased with his team's improvement. "It was a great run," he said. "We were very resilient, relentless. I'm so proud of my guys that they fought back all year. It was great to see that."

Balanced effort helps Centerville cruise to win

Centerville received contributions from its offense, defense and special teams as it advanced to the Region 2 final against eighth-seeded Huber Heights Wayne (8-5), which beat fifth-seeded Hilliard Davidson 31-7.

In addition to Alston's kickoff return, Parker Johnson scored on a 24-yard run and Shane Cole connected with Soren Vitas for a 40-yard TD pass to make it 21-0 in the first quarter. Johnson rushed for 131 yards and Cole passed for 230 yards and two scores.

Centerville outgained Coffman 445-294, Coach Brent Ullery was impressed with his team's defensive effort.

"Our defense practices really hard, plays really hard," he said. "They get off the ball and do what they can to control the line of scrimmage, and after the snap they get hats on the ball. They gang tackle with the best of them and they pursue to the ball. When you do that, you bottle up an electric offensive player."

Rivalry rematch: Next edition of Centerville-Wayne to be for regional

Nov. 21—As far as high school football games in the Miami Valley, they don't get much bigger than Centerville-Wayne.

Unless they're playing for a regional championship.

And, hey, what if they play at Welcome Stadium?

That will all be true Friday night as the Elks and Warriors aim for a spot in the Division I OHSAA state semifinals.

"I think it'll be a great atmosphere for both teams," said Wayne coach Roosevelt Mukes. "It definitely is close proximity for both of us, so it's kind of like we're meeting in the middle. So it'll be a great atmosphere and a great opportunity, and we look forward to the challenge of playing a very good Centerville team."

The Warriors are the No. 8 seed in Region II, but they have won seven of their last eight after starting 1-4. Centerville is the No. 2 seed and has won eight in a row along with a share of the GWOC championship.

Both teams started slowly but appear to be peaking at the right time.

"We knew we would have growing pains early," Centerville coach Brent Ullery said. "Even in early summer, we could tell we really needed to figure out our identity and what we do well, and what we were doing at the beginning of the summer is vastly different than what we are doing right now, and that's because we've been kind of feeling ourselves out trying to develop skill and talent at the same time as figuring out what those skills and talents are. "And then as we've progressed, we've had kind of a one day at a time mentality the entire season, and I think when you hyperfocus on one day being better than the last then, you know, the end result kind of takes care of itself."

The Elks turned out to be a classic Centerville team built on running the ball and playing good defense while Wayne still runs the type of wide-open, spread offense that swept football at all levels over the past two decades but has waned to a certain extent in recent seasons.

Mukes has the ideal personnel for such a strategy, though, as Warriors quarterback Tyrell Lewis has four Division I prospects to throw to on a typical play — receivers Teaunn Hunter, Gauge Miesse and Jamier Averette-Brown and tight end Kamaurri Smith — and a 1,100-yard rusher to hand off to in Isaiah Thompson.

"They're pretty loaded," said Ullery, who stressed not overlooking the Warriors defense. "They look like an old school Wayne team, man. They've got all these college football guys — top tier recruits — a quarterback running around slinging it. They look old school."

Lewis, who verbally committed to Arkansas State last summer, is the latest in a long line of dual-threat quarterbacks for Wayne that also includes Alex Earley, Braxton Miller and D'Mitrik Trice.

The 6-foot-1, 195-pounder has thrown for 1,765 yards and 20 touchdowns and run for 278 yards and three touchdowns despite missing four games with an injury.

"He gives us a chance to win each and every night we step out on the field," said Mukes, who put the ball in Hunter's hands when Lewis was out. "Teaunn a great job when he was in there, but now he can go to the wide receiver and make plays from there.

"Tyrell just gives us a great opportunity. That's our guy, so we rally around him, and we're just gonna go out and compete and play for each other."

The Elks also have a 1,100-yard rusher in Parker Johnson while quarterback Shane Cole has added 791 yards on the ground and 1,323 through the air.

Cole had 199 total yards — including 123 on the ground — while Johnson ran for 140 yards and three touchdowns as the Elks won the first matchup 38-14 in Week 10.

Lewis threw for 269 yards and two touchdowns but was also intercepted twice.

"We were happy with our game plan the first time we we played them, and our kids went out and executed it very well," Ullery said. "And I think that anytime you do that, regardless of side of the ball or what team you're on or anything, I think you give yourself a really good chance to win a football game."

The series began in 1956, and Centerville leads 36-33 after winning two of the last three.

The teams have played in the playoffs three times, including a 20-10 Wayne victory in the first round in 2020. Wayne also won memorable regional finals in 2005 (29-28) and 2010 (36-33 in overtime) with Earley and Miller playing hero in those games.

"I mean, there's really not a lot to talk about when you say, 'Wayne and Centerville,'" said Mukes, who like Ullery played in the rivalry for the team he coaches now. "It's one of those games that you look forward to. It's one of those games that you know is going to be physical. They're going to be very aggressive. They're going to play hard, and they're well-coached. That hasn't changed from from the time that I was in school."

The winner will move on to play a Cincinnati Greater Catholic League South team in the state semifinals at a neutral site next week. That will be No. 1 seed Moeller or No. 6 St. Xavier, who are scheduled to play in Mason this week.

Warriors rally to reach finals

Wayne erases 18-point deficit to edge Centerville

CINCINNATI — Down late by 18 points, Wayne's players shook their heads in disbelief. Seven minutes later, Centerville's players did the same thing.

The Warriors trailed Centerville by 18 points with 7:12 left Saturday afternoon at Paul Brown Stadium. The Elks' game of keepaway had worked perfectly in the Division I, Region 4 semifinal. Centerville had taken away the

ball, the clock and the field.

"It was dim and grim," Wayne football coach Jay Minton said. "But, we know our kids pretty well. I think that's when you start calling some time-outs and you have to give them a chance. We just needed a spark."

The fire was lit by Wayne quarterback Alex Earley and the Warriors' two-minute drill. Earley threw three touchdown passes in a 4:19 span as Wayne shocked Centerville, 29-28.

"He's special," Minton said of Earley, who completed 21 of 29 passes for 260 yards. "They all are. To have another week with these guys, it's something else. It's fun. It's exciting."

The Warriors (11-1) face Cincinnati St. Xavier (12-0) next Sat-

urday for a berth in the state semifinals. The doubleheader crowd of 35,000 saw the stunned Elks finish 10-2, with both losses to Wayne.

Centerville's Will Johnson capped an 18-play, 80-yard, 8:53 drive with a 2-yard run. Earlier, the Elks surprised Wayne with two touchdown passes, including a 40-yard halfback pass from Johnson to Scott Baldwin.

Up 28-10, the Elks milked the clock just like they planned.

"That's how we play. That's what we knew we had to do to win," Centerville coach Ron Ullery said. "We just needed to do it one more time. We didn't give it to them or anything like that. They just took it from us at the end."



Amazing catch key to Wayne comeback

- In a scrambling comeback, it was fitting that Wayne's most incredible play came on a quarterback scramble.

Alex Earley's throw was good, but Nick Childers' catch was better. The crowd at Paul Brown Stadium on Saturday gasped at the replays on the giant video screen. Behind 28-23 at midfield. Earley was flushed from the pocket and fired toward Childers.

"I thought I threw it out of bounds, and then, Nick, he's just a heck of a receiver," Earley said. "He's 6-4 and utilized his height."

Childers also utilized his hands, or at least his left hand. The lefty snagged the 23-vard pass with one hand, shielded a defender and landed barely inbounds.

"Oh, it was awesome," said Wayne's Joe Gilford, who caught the game-winner moments later. "The one-hand catch on a tightrope."

Childers reveled in the catch, but only after Wayne took the lead. A furious finish saw Wayne rally from a 28-10 deficit with 7: 12 left to a 29-28 victory.

"We had to make plays at the end of the game," he said. "It was our last chance. But it wasn't all about that play. It was about winning the game."

Third-quarter woes

Wayne ran just six plays for 13 yards in the third quarter.

"I give a lot of credit to Centerville," Wayne coach Jay Minton said, "Their offense kept us on our heels the whole game. We were out of rhythm, kept us on the sidelines. We were just, one word, discombobulated. I can't spell it. I'm surprised I can say it.'

Quick strikes

Wayne's last three scoring drives took almost no time. which was good because the Warriors were running out of it.

Wayne went 71 yards on seven plays in 1:39, 45 yards on four plays in 28 seconds and 87 yards on seven plays in 1:17.

Centerville had its own big plays as quarterback Dan Drake hit Robert Ponder on a 71-vard seam pass and running back Will Johnson found Scott Baldwin for a 40-vard score.

By the numbers

Centerville was 1-for-4 on fourth down. The Warriors stopped the Elks twice on fourth and 1. Up 28-23, the Elks punted on fourth-and-4 from Wayne's 41. The Warriors were just 1-of-8 on third downs while Centerville was 11-of-19. The Elks had the ball 31: 55 to Wayne's 16:05.

Quotebook

The game was nothing like Wayne's 38-0 win in Week 8. Instead, it was more like the Warriors' last-minute win over the Elks two years ago. "That's how Centerville-Wayne games are," Centerville coach Ron Ullery said. "I'll tell you, everybody in our locker room knew there wasn't 38 points difference between these two teams. We felt all week how it was a hair's difference between each team. That was it."

an overtime to decide the rematch between Wayne and Centerville.

Heck, make it a double. The area's best Division I high school football rivalry had a grand stage in Saturday night's D-I, Region 4 playoff semifinal at Welcome Stadium before a capacity crowd of 10,000. And the teams delivered an encore performance.

That Wayne won 36-33 in double-OT was a formality. Everyone knew before the game that the area was going to advance a Greater Western Ohio Conference team to a rare Region 4 final.

But getting there was one for area football history and an instant classic.

"This means a lot," said Braxton Miller, Wayne's ultra-celebrated quarterback who appropriately scored the winning touchdown on a 1-yard sneak.

"It's not easy to get past them."

That's the understatement of this magical Warriors season. Yet, that's exactly what Wayne did, twice, including a deceiving 34-10 win at Centerville in Week 8.

Now the Warriors (9-3) take another step toward their destiny against Cincinnati St. Xavier, a stunning 24-23 winner over previously unbeaten Colerain, also on Saturday. St. X, which had an open date in Week 10 and like Wayne barely sneaked into the playoffs, is 7-4.


"We found one play that could work and it worked," Bonner said. "I told Braxton that I could get open on the side corner."

"It was a fantastic game," Centerville coach Ron Ullery said.


"A few plays always determine the outcome of a game, and that was the case here. They made one more play than we made."






