

Elks Shut Out The Beavers



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Centerville Dominates Beavercreek 42-0 in First Round of OHSAA Playoffs

The Centerville Elks wasted no time establishing their dominance on Friday night, shutting out the Beavercreek Beavers 42-0 in the first round of the OHSAA state playoffs at Centerville Stadium. The Elks, who scored early and often, held Beavercreek scoreless in a performance that reflected their strength on both sides of the ball. By the second half, the game's outcome was clear, leading to a running clock for the remainder of play.

Centerville's head coach Brent Ullery praised his team's focus, stating, "We played tough, limited our mistakes, and executed complementary football to secure the first-round victory." The Elks' game plan was executed to near perfection, as they racked up 21 first downs compared to Beavercreek's two, and dominated in both rushing and passing yards.

Junior quarterback Shane Cole played a crucial role, completing 12 of 15 passes for 154 yards and a touchdown. Senior receiver J.P. Mercer made the most of those connections, hauling in four catches for 65 yards and scoring two touchdowns, including a stunning 27-yard reception. Meanwhile, junior running back Parker Johnson led the Elks' ground game with 98 rushing yards on 15 carries and crossed the goal line four times, showcasing his powerful, consistent running.

Defensively, the Elks were relentless. Senior defensive back Andrew Erwin made six tackles and returned two punts for 15 yards, while senior linebacker Jacob Taylor contributed five tackles. Junior defensive end Brady Seeley also played a key role in shutting down Beavercreek's limited offense, which only managed 77 yards across 34 plays.

For Beavercreek, the night was a struggle. Running back Kellen Reeves led with 49 rushing yards on 12 carries, while quarterback Jack Minnick's passing game was entirely stifled, completing zero of his two attempts. Despite efforts by defensive back Jamison Webster, who recorded eight tackles, the Beavers could not slow Centerville's relentless offense.

With this win, Centerville advances to the next round with momentum and confidence, looking to continue their playoff run and solidify their place as a contender in this year's championship race.



What's the team's overall mood and mindset going into the second-round playoff game?

We have been stressing Gratitude. We talked about how fortunate we are to be in the playoffs and how even more fortunate we are to be in the 2nd round of the playoffs. We have been talking a lot about how to show gratitude. We believe that we can show our gratitude by pouring into our situation. We can pour energy into our preparation. We can pour enthusiasm into our teammates. We can pour support into the game night. We can pour focus and discipline into doing our job and not trying to do someone else's job. Our players and coaches have done a great job so far being grateful for our situation that we are in.

Obviously having two home games in the playoffs is desired, what are some of the lesser-known benefits of a home game in the tournament?

We have been fortunate to have two, home playoff games each of the past three years. First, this is a tribute to the work that our program puts in and the support that our program has starting kids at a very young age. Our kids prepare like crazy and they have support at home that starts in the youth programs and on up. When you combine those two things, you're in position to compete for home playoff games and those are two big reasons why we have been so fortunate to host playoff games. I think it's a big advantage to host a playoff game. First, you get to be in front of your home crowd. No one has to travel or go anywhere unfamiliar. It's special to play at home in high school, especially in Centerville, and it's even more special to play at home, in Centerville, in the playoffs! Another advantage is that we get to play in front of our youth programs. The kids that will someday be varsity players get to see the playoff environment up close. That goes a long way for development and support of the youth programs. One more advantage (I'm sure there are more) is familiarity. We are in our own locker room with our own facilities and meeting rooms. We aren't "living out of a suitcase." It's one less thing to worry about. It's very similar to a regular season home game in that aspect.

Your team is set to face the number one quarterback in the GWOC. How do you plan to strategize your defense to handle his abilities?

That answer is easy. Sit back and watch the defense do their thing. As a head coach, I prefer to let people do their jobs. We have tremendous defensive coaches and tremendous defensive players. They know what they're doing. It's not my job to intervene and try to get them to do something. I may make a small suggestion from time to time, but those are rare. We have trusted them to do their job every other game, so this game won't be any different. So far this season, our staff has done a great job of coming up with defensive gameplans and our players have done a great job of practicing them during the week and executing them on Friday night. As for my job, as a primarily offensive coach, and handling this quarterback, we know that we must score points. We absolutely have to score points. We have to put our defense in situations where they do what they do best, and that requires scoring points

Coach, your team defeated Springboro 28-10 just three weeks ago. How do you plan to keep your players focused and motivated to avoid complacency and ensure a repeat performance?

That won't be hard with this group. They are mature. They know what's at stake. It's a conference opponent that they are familiar with. They know it will be a hard-fought game and that they have to play well and prepare well. The mindset is no different from our coaches. How you do anything is how you do everything. The previous result doesn't matter. This team hasn't been complacent after any of our wins so I would have no reason to think they would be this time either.


What are the keys to an Elk victory this Friday?

HILLIARD BRADLEY 34, SPRINGFIELD 30

Springfield stunned in 1st-round loss

SPRINGFIELD – The Springfield High School football program's playoff run ended earlier than anyone expected.

Trailing 28-27 in the fourth quarter, Wildcats junior Nathan Hudson hit a 39-yard field goal to give his team a two-point lead. A few minutes later, Hilliard Bradley scored a touchdown and held on to stun Springfield 34-30 in a D-I, Region 2 first-round playoff game Friday night at Springfield High School.

Wildcats senior Brent Upshaw ran for two touchdowns and threw a TD pass to senior Quenta Wafer, Jr. and junior Deontre Long rushed for a touchdown as Springfield finished the season 6-5.

The Wildcats, state runners-up each of the past three seasons and winners of five straight regional championships, hadn't lost a firstround playoff game since 2016.

"I hate it for our seniors, but when you don't pay attention to details and do the little things, things like this creep up on you," said Springfield coach Maurice Douglass. "This is the first early

exit we've had in a long, long time."

Hilliard Bradley sophomore quarterback Declan O'Neil threw four TD passes as the Jaguars (3-8) snapped a six-game losing streak and advanced to face rival Hilliard Davidson in a second-round game next week.

The Jaguars won the Region 3 title last season, falling to eventual state champion Lakewood St. Edward in a D-I state semifinal game. This year, the Jaguars entered the playoffs on a sixgame losing streak.

"We're real young," said Jaguars coach Mike LoParo. "We're playingsix freshmen and five sophomores. We're super young. But we do have some older kids that won a regional championship and understand that. ... Our league is tough. They've been coming up short and they decided to play hard tonight, play to their capabilities and we win the game."

Springfield took an early 14-0 lead on touchdown runs by Upshaw and Long in the first quarter. The Jaguars pulled to within seven points on a 32-yard run by Brady Rasor early in the second quarter. The Wildcats fumbled the ensuing kickoff and Hilliard Bradley recovered. Less than a minute later, the Jaguars scored on a 21-yard TD pass from O'Neil to sophomore Tre Pauleus to tie the game at 14.

"We can't have turnovers," Douglass said. "The fumble on the kickoff return gave them a little extra momentum. They had just got a touchdown and now you give them the ball right back and it's back-to-back (TDs). Now they've got the momentum on their side and they're moving."

Hilliard Bradley scored two more TDs – including a 10-yard pass from O'Neil to freshman Rashaud Truss with 25 seconds remaining – to take a 28-14 lead into the half.

Upshaw found Long near the end zone, but he fell short of the goal line.

With 8:48 remaining, Hudson's field goal gave the Wildcats a 30-28 lead. A few minutes later, the Jaguars took a 34-30 lead after O'Neil hit Pauleus on a 21-yard TD pass.

Springfield drove the ball to midfield with about four minutes remaining, but were held on fourth down. The Jaguars were able to run out the clock.

"It wasn't what we wanted," Douglass said of the early exit.

Things didn't go as planned for Springboro last fall. A 2-9 finish was not the way things should have ended. Now, the Panthers are looking to rebound and make the playoffs for a school record sixth straight time.

"We had a great season in 2022, but alot of injuries and problems with turnovers led to a disappointing season in 2023. This team is looking to get things right. The effort and attitudes have been excellent this offseason. It's a complete page turn from last year and there appears to be no lasting effects from struggles of last year," head coach Ryan Wilhite states.

The positivity is a huge plus but Wilhite knows his team still has to execute on both sides of the ball. "We have alot of experience on offense and return three linemen. If our o-line can protect our young quarterbacks while they grow up and we can establish a running game to take pressure off of them, this offense has a chance to be much improved from last season."

Wilhite goes on. "Defensively we lost a ton from last year. This unit will be tested but we appear to be solid at a lot of positions. We are a senior heavy along the defensive line but with not much experience. This group could go from a weakness to a strength, though. They are very hard working, blue collar. We will have a team effort approach with relentless effort and pursuit to the football."

Last season was an aberration. It was the program's first losing campaign since 2011. Look for Springboro to bounce back and finish on the winning side of the ledger.

Brayden Wilhite, Sr, WR – Will be one of the focal points of the offense after a breakout junior campaign. Wilhite had 31 receptions, 321 yards receiving and two touchdowns a year ago.

Braylen Smith, Sr, TE – Will be the Panthers starter at tight end. Smith is still looking for his first varsity reception.

Jackson Dulle, Sr, OL – A returning starter up front, Dulle will be called upon to provide senior leadership on the o-line.

Joseph Schenking, Sr, OL – Like Dulle the coaching staff will look to Schenking to be a leader in the trenches

Jack Harper, Jr, OL – One of the teams most pleasant surprises in 2023. Harper graded out as the Panthers top offensive lineman. He will move from right tackle to left tackle.

Mattias Brunicardi, Jr, RB – The staff is excited to see what Brunicardi can do. In Week 8 at last fall against Wayne, he ran for 171 of his 256 yards and his only touchdown on the season.

Jaxon Long, Jr, WR/DB – Will team with Wilhite to give the Panthers a potent punch at receiver. Long caught balls for 227 yards. He also had 13 total tackles as a sophomore.

Centerville Stadium's Inaugural Game: A Landmark Night for Local Football

When the Centerville Elks took the field for their season opener on Friday, September 7, 1979, the new Centerville Stadium was a shining symbol of the community's commitment to education and athletics. The state-of-the-art facility, with a seating capacity of 10,000, was the crown jewel of a \$5.4 million bond issue passed the previous year, aimed at revitalizing local infrastructure.


The bond, approved in October 1978, funded not only the new football stadium but also a new academic wing, a second gymnasium, a baseball field, an all-weather track, and tennis courts. Additionally, 35 acres were developed for intramural and softball fields, while the old football stadium was repurposed for soccer. Construction began in early 1979, with the goal of having the stadium ready for the upcoming football season—a goal that was met with remarkable precision.

The opening night saw the Elks facing off against the defending state champions, the Princeton Vikings. Despite the excitement surrounding the new venue, Princeton spoiled the debut by defeating Centerville 22-11 in front of a crowd of 11,000, with another 2,000 fans turned away at the gate. The crowd was thought to be the second-largest to ever attend a high school football game at that time.

During pre-game ceremonies, the stadium was dedicated to Dr. Everett Archdeacon, a 1942 Centerville High School graduate and a long-time supporter of the district's growth. The game, though a loss for the Elks, was still a historic moment for the community, marking the beginning of a new era in Centerville sports.

It wasn't long before the Elks made their mark in the new stadium. The following week, Centerville bounced back, defeating the Fairmont East Falcons 17-7 for their first victory in the newly constructed facility—a fitting way to celebrate the promise of the stadium as a center for both athletic achievement and community pride.


As Coach Bob Gregg had predicted, the new stadium proved to be a powerful motivator for both players and coaches, offering them not just a venue but a source of pride and inspiration for years to come.

Coach Gregg finds stadium something to crow about

Bob Gregg was proud as a peacock and fussy as a mother hen as he made his usual morning inspection.

"We got a leak in here that I'm going to have to tell them about," Gregg said Wednesday as he surveyed the visiting team's shower room in Centerville High School's new football stadium. "And there's another . . . Two leaks I'll have to tell them about . . . And there's a light out."

But as the Elks head football coach walked around the facility, showing a visitor around, a touch of pride crept into his voice.

"This is going to be one of the best stadiums around — if not the best," he said. "When can I move in?" he jokingly

"When can I move in?" he jokingly asked a workman. "My desk is out in my car."

"You can move in now," the workman replied. "But why don't you keep it in your car. That way you can always get to it."

FOR NOW, Gregg's desk will have to remain in his car. But not for long.

The Elks open their season and their stadium tomorrow against Cincinnati Princeton, the defending State champion. And Gregg is hoping that his brood does not lay an egg.

"If our mental attitude, is right, we should be able to beat them," he says.

And a win tomorrow would make the 10,000-seat stadium a much more livable coop for Gregg and his charges.

Notice that's more livable. The place already is not too bad as it is.

Besides the visiting locker and shower

rooms, which the Centerville reserve and freshman teams also will use, there is an overflow locker room, a meeting room complete with a classroom-size black-board, the visiting and home coaches' lock-errooms, the officials' room, an equipment room and a spacious varsity locker room.

TRUE, THE STADIUM is not completely finished; there are some spots that need to be sodded, others that need to be blacktopped and the all-weather track has to be put down. For the time being, though, it is ready for football.

One of the current jokes going around is to ask when Centerville University's

stadium will be finished. But Gregg doesn't think there is any extravagance involved in the stadium's construction.

"Our old stadium was bad," Gregg says.
"You would paint and it would look nice,
and then when it rained, paint would drip
down into the kids' lockers and on their
clothes. It would drip down on kids' heads.
You would turn out the lights and be
standing in water. There would be two
inches of water in the trainers' room.

"The kids in our program deserved better. When your program is going bad, you don't deserve anything good. But our program is going good and our kids deserve good facilities.

"It doesn't matter to me, I've never had good facilities. I can coach any place because I coach by intangibles. But our kids deserve it." FROM ALL INDICATIONS, this year's team deserves the facility. Or maybe it's the facility that deserves this year's team.

Senior Mike Chillinsky and junior Gary Alders share the quarterbacking duties for the veer offense, and Gregg has a host of running backs.

"I have five running backs," Gregg said, "and the worst one I got would've started last year."

Dave Evans leads the receiving corps.

"I'll tell you something about him," Gregg says. "He catches every ball thrown at him in practice. Everything. And he's made a couple of catches in scrimmages that were just great, but to us, they weren't unusual because Dave always catches the bail."

Catching the ball might just be the key to tomorrow's game — or not catching it, as the case may be.

PRINCETON COACH Pat Mancuso is predicting a more wide-open offense for the Vikings, who have only three starters returning from last year's squad. Those three are keys to Mancuso's veer offense, however.

Quarterback Gary Nagel is back. So are wide receiver Thad Gibbs and offensive end-defensive tackle Rick Smith.

Mancuso has two sets of backs he uses—seniors Larry Scott and Bernard Williams and juniors David Keeling and Charles Emory. Although Mancuso says all four run 40 yards in 4.7 seconds, the Vikings have to be hurt by the loss of Ken Roundtree and Leroy Stenson, each of whom ran for over 1,000 yards last year.

"That's one of the areas we're weak in," Mancuso said.

Princeton opens new Centerville stadium

Getting there could be half the fun tonight as Centerville opens its new football stadium against defending state champion Princeton.

The bulk of the construction on the new 10,000-seat facility is done, with the field in excellent shape and the lights all set to go. The big question is whether there will be enough parking for the overflow crowd expected and whether the Centerville Police can keep traffic moving smoothly in the area to avoid a massive traffic jam.

"There should be enough parking if it doesn't rain," said Centerville athletic director Ken Simmons. "We have enough space back there but the weather has not given them time to get the lots ready. But if it's dry we should

be able to get everybody in. But I'm sure it will be a little hectic because this is our first game here."

BOTH CENTERVILLE coach Bob Gregg and Princeton's Pat Mancuso feel they have their teams ready to go. Princeton defeated Centerville last year, 33-10, at Princeton. Much of the result of that game had to do with Princeton's quickness, especially on three key punt returns.

"We won't be as quick as we were last year," sald Mancuso. "In fact we will be a lot slower at most positions. That speed and quickness was the thing that really carried us last year. We hope to be the same type of big play team that we were last year. But it takes a while to develop that type of offense."

Princeton went 11-0-0 while winning

the state title. Mancuso has three regulars back off that team including quarterback Gary Nagel, split end Thad Gibbs and tackle Rick Smith. A total of nine players from last year's state championship team received major college scholorships.

But even with only three returning starters, Princeton is rated 14th in the nation by a sports service out of Arizona. "We feel like winning the state title is a very emotional thing and gives these kids a lot of pride," said Mancuso. "That may have to carry us early in the season until we get things put together the way we want."

THE KEY TO Princeton, according to Mancuso, could lie in his running backs.

He is using four players in alternating spots, including seniors Larry Scott (5-8, 165) and Bernard Williams (5-10, 175) and juniors David Keeling and Charles Emery. Both are 5-9 and 180 pounds.

"None of our backs are as good as the two we had last year. But we feel they are good ones. We'll find out real quick this year if we are going to be in the same class as last year with the first, four games we play," Mancuso said.

After opening with Centerville this week, Princeton plays Cincinnati Moeller at the University of Cincinnati's Nippert Stadium next week, followed by games with Upper Arlington and Cincinnati Elder.

The opening of the new stadium, the attraction of the defending state champion against one of Dayton's perennial powers, plus a great night weather-wise for football brought out the people.

OVER 11,000 got in the place with more than 2,000 turned away. It is thought to be the second largest crowd ever to witness a prep football game in the Dayton area in recent years. A Belmont-Chaminade game in the early 60s drew over 16,000 at Welcome stadium.


